The History of James Madison University and Its Engineering Department

- General JMU History
- JMU Engineering History

1908-1920

- **1908 -** On March 12, Virginia Governor Claude A. Swanson signed the General Assembly bill creating the State Normal and Industrial School for Women at Harrisonburg.
 - Julian Ashby Burruss became the first president of the school.
- **1909 -** On September 27, Nannie Sword of Lee County became the first student to arrive at the new school
 - The enrollment was 150 students along with 15 faculty on campus.
- **1910 -** School held its first summer session which was also the first held in Virginia. Both men and women were students during this session.
- 1911 The first 20 graduates received diplomas.
- 1914 The institution's name changed to State Normal School for Women at Harrisonburg.
- **1916 -** Authorization was received for the school to reward bachelor's degrees.

1921-1930

- **1922 -** The student run newspaper The Breeze was created
- 1924 Institution was renamed to State Teachers College at Harrisonburg.
- 1927 Hunter Lee Jackson of McGaheysville became the first male student to receive a degree.

1931-1940

- 1938 The institution was renamed Madison College in honor of President James Madison.
 - Enrollment passed 1,000.

1941-1950

1946 - Men enrolled as day students during the institution's regular session for the first time.

1951-1960

- 1952 Madison College purchased an additional 200 acres on what would become East Campus.
- 1954 The college was authorized to award Master's degrees.

1961-1970

- **1964 -** Enrollment passed 2,000.
- **1966 -** The General Assembly approved full coeducational status and men were enrolled as resident students for the first time.
- Sheary Darcus (now Johnson), the first African American student, was enrolled and graduated in 1970.

1971-1980

- **1971 -** Academic divisions were reorganized into schools that would become all the different colleges that make up Madison College.
- 1972 First Dorm designated for males, "Shorts Hall" was built.
- **1974 -** John C. Wells Planetarium was built in memory of a professor in the JMU Physics Department
- 1977 Madison College was renamed James Madison University, effective 1979

1981-1990

- **1980 -** The James Madison School of Nursing was created.
- **1988 -** In December The JMU Greater University Commission produces a report that recommends "JMU establish a program which builds on the knowledge of science and mathematics but incorporates a commitment to society and human beings."
- 1989 The JMU Board of Visitors directs JMU to develop a proposal for a new College of Applied Science and Technology (CAST) and President Carrier assembles a "Blue Ribbon Panel" composed of prestigious leaders from industry, government, and education for advice on its structure, curriculum, and programs of study.

1991-2000

- **1990 -** JMU formally responds to the Commission on the University of the 21st Century and proposes CAST (later known as the College of Integrated Science and Technology, CISAT) as an autonomous, new college within the university. The proposal is enthusiastically received and approved with funding to hire the first provost.
- **1992 -** The CISAT provost hires faculty for the ISAT program, the flagship academic program in the college at that time. Industry and government experience are hallmarks for these new hires and they create and develop the first ISAT courses. The State Council for Higher Education in Virginia approves ISAT as a Bachelor of Science (BS) degree program.

- **1993** The first undergraduate students enter JMU as ISAT majors. Nine full-time faculty members teach courses to 66 freshmen in a modular building uphill from the Convocation Center.
- 1994 The first Furious Flower Poetry Conference took place at JMU.
- **2000** A Master's of Science in ISAT is created and its first students are accepted.

2001-2010

- 2001 The Marching Royal Dukes had their first appearance in the Macy's Day Parade
- 2005 JMU purchased Rockingham Memorial Hospital
- **2008 -** John C. Wells Planetarium underwent a \$1.5 million renovation to help prevent flooding on campus
 - Engineering program created at JMU

2011-Present Day

- **2011** Became an ABET accredited program.
- 2012 The ISAT Department joins the Departments of Engineering and Computer Science in the new College of Integrated Science and Engineering (CISE), when the College of Integrated Science and Technology (CISAT) splits. ISAT faculty member Bob Kolvoord becomes the Dean of CIS
 - An outdoor recreational center, UPark, was opened
- The school newspaper, The Breeze, won the Online Pacemaker award, Virginia Press Award for Best in Show for a Non-Daily News Presentation, and a VPA sweepstakes award.
- **2014 -** Created the MADE engineering xChange as an outlet for junior and senior engineering students to show their work to the world.
- **2015 -** Created the 4+1 Accelerated Masters of engineering program for students to spend 1 year following undergrad at Virginia Tech to earn their Masters of Engineering.
- 2019 JMU was ranked 2nd for public master's degrees by U.S. News & World Report
- **2021 -** The ISAT/CS building is renamed to King Hall after Charles W. King, Jr., longtime Vice President of Administration of Finance at JMU

A History of the JMU Candidate Chapter of Theta Tau

A General History

Longing to be a part of an organization that encouraged academic and professional development, a sophomore Integrated Science and Technology (ISAT) student, Juliana May, looked through the organizations that James Madison University had to offer. She tried to join an engineering fraternity but was turned away, due to it being for males only. This led Juliana to research professional fraternities that would create a strong sense of community of all genders within academic life and provide members the chance to further their careers. Theta Tau became the organization of choice because not only is it coed and open to engineering majors but is also open to those with the majors of ISAT, Computer Science, and Computer Information Systems. Theta Tau's core values also encompassed what she was looking for: brotherhood, service and profession.

The idea of Theta Tau was presented to other students with the majors that fraternity accepts to ensure the James Madison Community would benefit from this organization. Juliana was encouraged to form this organization as many students expressed interest. The group reached out to the Theta Tau Central Office to commence the process of becoming an official candidate chapter.

In December of 2017, the Expansion Director, Zack Johnson came to Harrisonburg to hold an interest meeting for potential candidate chapter members at JMU. After this meeting the interested students adopted the bylaws and became a local fraternity. They then elected temporary officers.

After the meeting, the organization strived to reach candidate chapter status and continued their efforts to expand. They had reached out to JMU faculty and administration to become a recognized organization on campus and Dr. Emily York, an associate professor of ISAT, agreed to be their advisor. As a local fraternity the students recruited new members and conducted interviews to further establish Theta Tau.

Fall 2018, the members of Theta Tau held their first general body meeting. The temporary officers that were elected during the first informational session met regularly prior to that. During this meeting, the members discussed the petition and how the organization can achieve candidate chapter status. Members planned various events to establish and strengthen the brotherhood aspects of the organization. These events include brother hang out sessions and playing sports together. The first chair elections were held this same semester.

Fall of 2018 the members of Tau Theta submitted their candidate chapter petition and the petition was approved. The members of Tau Theta still held multiple events before being certified as a colony. These events included camping trips, and Thanksgiving Potlucks nicknames "Thetasgiving".

On January 18, 2019 the candidate chapter at JMU was certified. Shortly after, the JMU candidate chapter held its first executive board election and that spring began its first rush process. Though it was the first rush and new member process, it was nonetheless successful.

The brothers continued to maintain their brotherhood over the summer by meeting up for fundraising events and bonding events and this continued into Fall of 2019.

As the JMU candidate chapter tried to continue to expand, Spring of 2020 we were hit with a global pandemic resulting in all education and most of the world becoming virtual. As incoming students and current members were not on campus for Fall of 2020 it was very hard to recruit new members but the passion within the members was still present.

Spring of 2021 the current members did not want to see all of their hard work of this candidate chapter no longer be present on the campus of JMU anymore. Fall of 2021 we slowly but surely started the rush process and recruited 6 new members and held new executive elections, in the Spring of 2022 we recruited 18 new members.

Fall of 2022, with no more pandemic, a new executive board, and rush committee in place we were able to recruit 27 new members. During this time our previous advisor stepped down and we have since gained a new advisor, Dr. Jared Stolztfuz. Our new advisor helped us access our student organization mailbox located in the university clubhouse. Our elected secretary goes through a three-day training seminar through the university to be able to secure rooms for meetings, as well as register a room to use for weekly chapter and new member education.

The James Madison Candidate Chapter of Theta Tau has suffered from loss of communication, loss of active members, and poor advertising for new membership. Our organization was able to overcome these difficulties through a dedication to better our organization. We are able to create the most out of less than promising circumstances and regrow with new members who are passionate and excited about the organization's future. Despite the difficulties this candidate chapter faced, and numerous extensions, the current members of our candidate chapter were able to be resilient and secure a strong footing for the future.


